FY2025 DISTRIBUTION of 9-1-1 FUND PROCEDURES

Below was the procedure used to determine the population for the FY2025 distribution of 9-1-1 funds.

The following procedure will be used to determine the population and land mass for each PSAP area.

- a. Ensure all population estimates will use the latest population estimates provided by the US census
- b. If a 9-1-1 center is the entire county, then use the population estimate from the latest census estimates will be used for that PSAP.
- c. If there are multiple 9-1-1 centers in a particular county then the following process should be used.
 - 1. Use ESRI community analyst to determine the population of each PSAP within the boundaries of a multi-PSAP county.
 - 2. Add the ESRI population estimate for each PSAP within the County.
 - 3. Use population per asap per county in b above to determine the percentage of population per PSAP in the county they are in.
 - 4. Once a percentage is determined then that percentage should be used against the county population in the 2023 Census population estimates (see #1 above) to determine the PSAP population estimate.
 - 5. For PSAPs that overlap into multiple counties then the population for the area in each county should be added together to determine the overall PSAP population.

9-1-1 Management Authority FY2025 Budget Statement

The 9-1-1 Management Authority's purpose is outlined in Oklahoma Statute §63-2861 et seq. Part of the 9-1-1 Management Authority duEes, outlined in §63-2864.3, states that the Authority shall "work in conjuncEon with the Oklahoma Department of Emergency Management to create an annual budget for the Authority, which shall be approved by the Majority vote of the members".

Also, with the changes in HB1590, the State is now obligated to "Establish contracts for the necessary equipment and services to deliver 9-1-1 calls to the public safety answering points" as outlined in §63-2864.18. This moves the State from a coordinaEon role in 9-1-1 to an Administrator role since we are now responsible for call delivery. This changes both our long-term and short-term budget needs.

The aUached draV budget is being presented during the regularly scheduled May, 2024 Authority meeEng for discussion and approval. Below are the changes to the budget for FY2025.

FY2025 REVENUE

The "Carry over from FY2024" is inclusive of the following known factors:

- 1. Carryover from FY2024 includes the average collecEon of the State allocaEon from the 9-1-1 fee funding over the current fiscal year.
- 2. Known expenditures for the remaining Fiscal year.
- 3. Grant payouts esEmates as of March 2024.
- 4. Increase in revenue from the passing of House Bill 1590 which was projected to begin in April but started in January.

FY2023 Expenditures

Salaries and Benefits

Staff has not received an increase in pay since 2022. The ExecuEve CommiUee has agreed to increase all posiEons by a minimum of 3% for FY2025.

State 9-1-1 Programs Officer:

In an effort to align compensaEon with required tasks, the ExecuEve CommiUee recommends changing the 9-1-1 Programs Officer to the Etle of 9-1-1 Programs Coordinator. This posiEon serves many roles including but not limited to, administraEve assistant to the State 9-1-1 Coordinator and other staff members, CoordinaEng the State report, managing the 9-1-1 Authority meeEngs, social media publicaEons, data and informaEon organizaEon, and vast other duEes.

With this the recommendaEon is to reclassify this posiEon from 9-1-1 Programs Officer to 9-1-1 Programs Coordinator. Also to align with other program coordinators in OEM and Homeland Security an increase in pay from \$56,975 to \$65,000 is recommended.

State 9-1-1 Training Coordinator:

The State 9-1-1 Training Coordinator was hired in FY2023 as a part-Eme posiEon working no more than twenty hours at an hourly rate of \$25.00. As expected, and with the changes in House Bill 1590, there is a need for this posiEon to move to full-Eme. It is the recommendaEon of the State 9-1-1 Coordinator to move this posiEon to a full-Eme, 40 hour per week, employee with a full State offered benefit package. The recommended salary for this posiEon is \$65,000 per year. This will align with other similar Training coordinators in OEM and Homeland Security.

9-1-1 Cyber Security Specialist:

This posiEon is dependent on a grant through Homeland Security. This posiEon will work with the 9-1-1 Technology Coordinator. The Grant will fund the salary, benefits, travel, training, and soVware tools needed for educaEon and assessments.

9-1-1/988 liaisons

This posiEon is dependent on a grant through the Federal program SAMSA that is rolling out 988. We have been working with 988 for a few years and they have idenEfied a gap that they would like 9-1-1 to help with. These posiEons will work with the 9-1-1 Training Coordinator to streamline the procedures between each 9-1-1 center and ECC to the State 988 call center. The Grant will fund the salary, benefits, travel, training, and soVware tools needed for educaEon and assessments.

Maintenance and Operations

- 1. Cellular Telephone has increased to fund the new phones being added by the grant program.
- 2. Training and Travel has been increased to fund the travel and training for the grant posiEons. Travel is also increased to cover added travel for NG9-1-1 planning and deployment.
- 3. Online training is increased slightly to allow for an overlap in contracts between the Virtual Academy and MoeEvaEons. MorEvaEons contract will end in January of 2025.
- 4. The operaEons commiUee has requested addiEonal in-person training classes that would be managed by the 911 Training Coordinator. They have specifically asked for more leadership training and advanced classes, beyond what is offered by the online training program.
- 5. Computer Hardware was purchased in FY2023 and this account will move to a maintenance account.
- 6. The 9-1-1 Coordinator workshop has been added to a line item in the budget. Last year the Authority funded \$30,000 for the 9-1-1 Coordinator Workshop. The workshop came in at under \$25,000 however we were not able to fully fund the rooms that were needed.

Capital Outlay

- CommiUee funding
- There is no change to CommiUee funding for FY2024

PROJECTS and GRANTS

State 9-1-1 Grant Program

It is the recommendaEon of the AdministraEve CommiUee to develop new or modified training guidelines for a new grant program to meet the goals of the Authority. The budget for the new grant program is set at 7.5 million. There is 2.1 million that will sEll be available under the exisEng grant program.

FY2023 Funding Sustainability Grant

The funding sustainability grants will no longer be needed for FY2025.

NG9-1-1 Planning and Deployment

There has been no change to the projecEons to fund NG9-1-1. The NG911 Planning and Deployment will remain at 8 million. This will fund NG9-1-1 Core Services, EsiNet, and other Statewide technologies deemed necessary by the Authority.

Close out of FY2022 grant program

Reserve

The Reserve account has increased to \$6,391,320. The main reason for the high increase in the reserve is that the State will be responsible for call delivery. We will need to push this reserve to ensure we have one year of reserve to pay for staff and services. 9-1-1 Fees are the only source of revenue for the Authority.
