The former Department of Corrections Kate Barnard Center at 3200 N.W. 39th St., Oklahoma City, will be auctioned by sealed bid June 15, 2015, at 10:00 a.m. in the Will Rogers Building, 2401 N. Lincoln Blvd., Oklahoma City. The property is appraised at \$780,000.00 in "as is" marketable condition. No bids of less than 90 percent of the

appraised value will be accepted by OMES. Sale proceeds will go into the Maintenance of State Building Revolving Fund. REALS has received numerous calls about this property.

Spiro Mounds—Surface Lease

REALS will conduct a sealed bid auction of a 100-acre surface lease for hay in the Spiro Mounds area in Leflore County.



Spiro Mounds is one of Oklahoma's most important prehistoric Native American archeological sites. The site grew from a small farming village into an important cultural center in what later became the United States. Between A.D. 850 and 1450, 12 mounds, ceremonial areas and a support city were created for the Caddoan-speaking leadership who participated in the Mississippian Culture. The protected Spiro Mounds site encompasses 150 acres.

REALS is determining a timeline for the auction of the former Enid Recycling Center, which was built in 1964 and acquired by the Oklahoma Department of Human Services in 2009. The first Osage chief named Pawhuska, which means White Hair, reportedly earned the name through a battle with American troops in Ohio. As the chief tried to scalp an officer, the officer's wig came off and he escaped. It is said that the chief was so impressed he kept the wig for the rest of his life and became known as White Hair. REALS recently worked with the Oklahoma Historical Society on a surface lease for 360



acres, more or less, in Ralston, Osage County, OK, through sealed bid auction.
