

WHAT IS NOPIP?

WORKSHOP GOALS

The goal of NOPIP's annual ethics symposium is to provide mental health practitioners in Oklahoma with an opportunity to learn about and discuss ethical considerations in a wide range of topics. The emphasis of this workshop is to address the ethical conflicts experienced in a variety of mental health domains.

CEU CREDITS

NOPIP has attained continuing education units from the Oklahoma Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services. The Institute for Mental Health and Substance Abuse Education and Training has approved 6.00 credit hours through the Oklahoma State Board of Licensed Social Workers, the Oklahoma Board of Examiners of Psychologists, the Licensed Marital and Family Therapist Committee, the Oklahoma Board of Licensed Alcohol and Drug Counselors, the Licensed Professional Counselors Committee, and the Council for Law Enforcement Education and Training. Continuing education is also approved for Certified Case Managers, Peer Recovery Support Specialists, and Certified Prevention Specialists. Two of the sessions (marked with a * before the title) are also approved for ODMHSAS supervisory credit. Certificates will be distributed at the end of the training. Participant evaluations forms must be submitted in order to receive continuing education credit and a certificate of attendance. There is a \$5.00 charge for any reissuing of certificates

FIRST MORNING SESSION: 8:30-10:00AM

- *** Ethical Considerations When Infringing Upon Autonomy: Coercion, Protection, or is it all Just Semantics?** with Andrea Reed, JD, PhD and Phillip Leon, MD. Dr. Reed received her Juris Doctorate from Washburn University School of Law and her Master of Arts and Doctorate in Clinical Psychology from the Clinical-Community Psychology program at Wichita State University. Dr. Reed completed her pre-doctoral internship through NOPIP working at TU Counseling Center and Laureate Psychiatric Hospital and Clinic on the Adult Behavioral Health Unit. Dr. Leon is a Staff Psychiatrist with Laureate Psychiatric Clinic and Saint Francis Hospital. Dr. Leon is also the Medical Director of the Adult Inpatient Behavioral Health Unit. He is Board Certified by the American Academy of Psychiatry and Neurology.
- **Ethical Issues in Juvenile Competency** with Kathryn LaFortune, JD, PhD. Dr. LaFortune is a Forensic Psychologist contracted through the United States Probation Office for the Northern District of Oklahoma. She is Chief of Special Services-Forensic Psychology and a Capital Trial Counsel Mitigation Specialist for the Oklahoma Indigent Defense System. Dr. LaFortune holds Adjunct Faculty positions with New York Law School, TU Department of Psychology and College of Law, Langston University, and Oklahoma State University College of Osteopathic Medicine. Dr. LaFortune recently received an award for Distinguished Professional Service from the Oklahoma Psychological Association.
- *** Cultural Competence in Health Care Settings** with Sherri Tapp, EdD. Dr. Tapp is an Associate Professor in the Graduate School of Education at Oral Roberts University. She received her Masters of Science in Applied Behavioral Studies in Education from Oklahoma State University and her Doctor of Education from Oklahoma State University. Dr. Tapp a member of the Executive Board of Directors for Supporters of Families with Sickle Cell and is a member of the Oral Roberts University Child Welfare Advisory Committee. Dr. Tapp is published in the areas of multiculturalism and cultural competence within the healthcare setting.

SECOND MORNING SESSION: 10:15-11:45AM

- **Ethics and Personality Assessment** with Allan Harkness, PhD and John McNulty, PhD. Both Dr. Harkness and Dr. McNulty are Associate Professors at the University of Tulsa and are actively involved in the Institute of Biochemical and Psychological Study of Individual Differences at TU, which focuses on the development of fundamental theories about the nature of the behavioral systems that structure and guide adaptive behavior. Dr. Harkness and Dr. McNulty are authors of the MMPI-2 and the MMPI-2 RF Personality Psychopathology Five (PSY-5), a dimensional model of personality, and have many published works in the area of personality assessment.
- **Ethical Issues in Child and Adolescent Psychology** with Joanna Shadlow, PhD and Megan Ballew, PhD. Dr. Shadlow completed her master's and Ph.D. at Kansas State University, she participated in an internship with the UAMS Child Study Center in Little Rock, Arkansas in 2007. Shortly after, she joined the faculty at Langston University as an assistant professor in the Psychology Department at the Tulsa campus. In 2008, she became a visiting applied assistant professor in the Psychology Department of TU, and was named an applied assistant professor in 2009. Currently, Dr. Shadlow serves as a psychology undergraduate committee member and as a clinical program committee member at TU. Dr. Ballew received her Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology from Oklahoma State University in 2005. Dr. Ballew completed her internship at the West Virginia University School of Medicine in 2005. Dr. Ballew provides weekly individual supervision to IHCRC interns, as well as providing didactic trainings and group supervision. Dr. Ballew's clinical interests include working with American Indian children, adolescents, and families, with specific interests in the areas of parenting, child abuse and neglect, mood and anxiety disorders, and trauma focused treatments. In addition to her clinical and training responsibilities she is actively involved with the Tulsa Indian Community Advisory Team (TICAT) and Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA).

- **Ethical Considerations in the Treatment of Trauma in Both Inpatient and Outpatient Settings** with Alyssa Rippy, PhD. Dr. Rippy graduated from the University of Tulsa. She received a Masters degree in industrial/organizational psychology and a doctorate in clinical psychology. She is a psychologist on the inpatient psychiatric unit at Jack. C. Montgomery VAMC. She works with veterans diagnosed with severe mental illness. Dr. Rippy is also an adjunct professor at the University of Tulsa. The majority of her research experience has focused on the relationship between trauma exposure and paranoia.
 - **Telehealth: Ethics and Integration Into Psychology Practice** with Pam Fordeucey, PhD. Dr. Fordeucey is the Director at Integris Telehealth and Information Technology Applications. She is a grant reviewer and chairperson for the Health Resources and Services Administration on Health Information Technology. Dr. Fordeucey also sits on the Oklahoma Traumatic Neurologic Advisory Council through Oklahoma State Department of Health, Injury Prevention. She has over 12 years of experience in research and practice in the area of telehealth.

- **Ethical Issues in the Assessment and Treatment of Juvenile Sex Offenders** with Steve Grissom, PhD. Dr. Grissom has been the Chief Psychologist at the Oklahoma Office of Juvenile Affairs since 2001 and previously worked at the L.E. Rader Center. He has over 25 years of experience working in the delinquency system and extensive experience with program administration in secure settings. He has developed intervention programs for juvenile delinquents and has teaching experience at OSU, NSU, LU and TCC.
 - **Professional Ethics in Court-related Therapy vs. Traditional Psychotherapy** with Daniel Stockley, PhD. Dr. Stockley graduated from Oklahoma State University in 1989 with a Ph.D. in Counseling Psychology. He has extensive experience in the field of forensic psychology providing child custody evaluations and working with juveniles involved in the criminal justice system. Dr. Stockley is currently in private practice in the Tulsa area and conducts forensic evaluations.
 - **Ethics and Diversity Issues in Psychotherapy** with Al Carlozzi, EdD, LMFT. Dr. Carlozzi is a Professor at Oklahoma State University. He currently serves as the director of the Oklahoma State University-Tulsa Counseling Center. Dr. Carlozzi is a recipient of the Oklahoma State University Regents Distinguished Teaching Award. In the past, Dr. Carlozzi has served as the head of the School of Applied Health and Educational Psychology at Oklahoma State University. In addition, Dr. Carlozzi is a licensed marital and family therapist who works in private practice.
