CONFERENCE PLENARY SPEAKERS



Dr. Edward Latessa

Dr. Edward Latessa received his Ph.D. from the Ohio State University in 1979 and is a Professor and Director of the School of Criminal Justice at the University of Cincinnati. Dr. Latessa has published over 140 works in the area of criminal justice, corrections, and juvenile justice. He is co-author of eight books including *What Works (and Doesn't) in Reducing Recidivism*, *Corrections in the Community*, and *Corrections in America*. Professor Latessa has directed over 150 funded research projects including studies of day reporting centers, juvenile justice programs, drug courts, prison programs, intensive supervision programs, halfway houses, and drug programs. He and his staff have also assessed over 600 correctional programs throughout the United States, and he has provided assistance and workshops in over forty-five states. Dr. Latessa served as President of the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences from 1989-1990.

Dr. David Mee-Lee

David Mee-Lee, M.D. is a board-certified psychiatrist and is certified by the American Board of Addiction Medicine (ABAM). He is based in Davis, CA and trains and consults both nationally and internationally. Dr. Mee-Lee is Chief Editor of The ASAM Criteria and is Senior Vice President of The Change Companies. He is also a Senior Fellow, Justice Programs Office (JPO) of the School of Public Affairs (SPA) at American University, Washington, DC. and Vice President of the Institute for Wellness Education, in Teaneck, NJ. Dr. Mee-Lee has over thirty years experience in person centered treatment and program development for people with co-occurring mental health and substance use conditions.

Jill Amos

Jill Amos is currently Coordinator of Recovery Support Services where she trains and oversees the Certifications of Peer Recovery Support Specialists for the state of Oklahoma. She was previously employed with the ODMHSAS Office of the Advocate General from October 2010 through August 2012. Prior to that, she worked for Central Oklahoma Community Mental Health Center as a case manager for the Program of Assertive Community Treatment for over 5 years. She received her bachelor's degree from Oklahoma State University in Sociology in 2003. Currently, she's nearing completion of a Master's of Human Relations with the University of Oklahoma. In addition to studies at OSU and OU, she has taken courses in sociology and psychology from Northern Oklahoma College, Northwestern Oklahoma State, and the University of Central Oklahoma. Jill is very passionate about helping others and making mental health services available to more Oklahomans. She is focused on promoting overall wellness of mind and body to persons receiving services and increasing opportunities for those in recovery from mental illness and/or addiction.



Stan Ardoin

Stan Ardoin is a board certified psychiatrist who has focused his career on public mental health in the state of Oklahoma. He graduated from OU Health Sciences Center in 1990 with a degree in medicine and completed a course of training at the Griffin Memorial Psychiatric Residency Program. He has worked in several ODMHSAS facilities in Oklahoma, including Carl Albert Community Mental Health Center and the Oklahoma County Crisis Intervention Center. For several years he worked at various prisons including Mable Bassett Correctional Center and Oklahoma State Penitentiary. He was Residency Director for the Griffin Training Program for two years and spent approximately 5 years as Griffin's Clinical Director and Medical Director for the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services. Part of her supervisory responsibilities include Misdemeanors, Probation Violations, all treatment programs including Drug Court, DUI Court, Mental Health Court, Female Diversion, Women's REMERGE, and the Oklahoma County Veterans' Diversion Program(OCVP). calling is in public service and that forming and being a part of this Veterans' Diversion program is one of the most rewarding parts of her career. She is married to Scott Anderson, who is a criminal defense attorney in Oklahoma City.

Ray Caesar

Ray Caesar has worked in the addictions field for over thirty years, as a clinician, educator, consultant, author, and program director. His efforts have been in both the treatment and the prevention arenas. He has authored numerous pamphlets, manuals and one book. He has extensive background in program development, having created and operated several alcohol and drug treatment programs, ranging from outpatient to residential and inpatient detoxification units. Paul Cary



Paul Cary is director of the Toxicology and Drug Monitoring Laboratory at University of Missouri Health Care in Columbia, Missouri. For over thirty years, Mr. Cary has been actively involved in the management of a nationally-recognized toxicology laboratory that performs drug testing for drug courts, hospitals, mental health facilities, attorneys, coroners and medical examiners, athletic programs, and public and private employers. He has authored numerous scientific publications and monographs, has served on a variety of clinical and technical advisory committees, teaches at the university, is involved in drug testing research, and serves as a consultant in toxicology-related matters. Mr. Cary has also provided judicial education including lecturing at the National Judicial College on alcohol pharmacology, the use of expert testimony and on drug testing issues. He has been certified as an expert and provided expert testimony in court (local, state and federal) and in labor arbitration. Mr. Cary has been a resource to drug court teams throughout the nation and overseas and serves as visiting faculty for the National Association of Drug Court Professionals, the

Center for Court Innovation, the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges and the National Drug Court Institute.

Mary Culley

Mary Culley is the Tribal Government Relations Specialist for the Southern Plains and Southeastern Region, covering the following states: Alabama, Florida, Kansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina and Central/Eastern Texas. A military dependent herself, Mary joined the Air Force June 1979 and served for 20 years, retiring June 1999. Heather Coyle has been an Assistant District Attorney with the Oklahoma County District Attorney's office for 17 years. She supervises the Drug and DUI Court Programs and oversees the Reremerge, Female Diversion, Mental Health Court, and Day Reporting programs. Heather graduated from the University of Oklahoma in 1996 with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Political Science and then graduated from the University of Oklahoma College of Law with a Juris Doctor in 1999. She began as a licensed legal intern in the Oklahoma County District Attorney's office in May of 1998. She was a traditional prosecutor for over 10 years prosecuting drug, property, homicide, violent and domestic violence crimes. She has been working with specialty court programs for almost 8 years. During her time in Kansas, Melissa became an advocate for the mentally ill after she realized how many people were incarcerated due to their mental illness. Additionally, she began to educate herself regarding mental health issues and substance abuse issues so that she could better serve that population. After moving to Oklahoma, she continued to advocate for the mentally ill. The issue has become her passion. In 2011, Melissa became the supervisor for the division of the Oklahoma County Public Defender's Office that handles all specialty courts, including DUI court, Drug Court, Mental Health Court, Female Diversion, and Reremerge. Additionally, the 5 person division handles all misdemeanor and felony revocation cases, and the misdemeanor docket. Melissa also serves as the coordinator for the office's intern programs. He began his recovery process on May 9, 2012 when he attended a 28-day inpatient rehab for PTSD with Alcohol Dependence. In March 2013, Eric separated from the Air Force but was unable to find work due to his mental health disorder and lack of education. During that time he volunteered with various community organizations until he found an opportunity at the Oklahoma Crisis Recovery Unit as a Peer Recovery Support Specialist. Realizing that he had an underutilized skillset, he joined the Oklahoma City VA in December 2014 and began working in the Veterans Recovery Center (VRC), an outpatient Psychosocial Rehabilitation and Recovery Center.



Judge Steve Goss

Stephen S. Goss is state circuit judge presiding in Albany, Georgia. In 2002, Judge Goss founded the Dougherty Superior Court MH/SA Treatment program, one of the early felony mental health court programs. This program, in a resource challenged, rural part of the state, was named one of five national Learning Sites for mental health courts by the United States Department of Justice Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) and the Council of State Governments (CSG). The program has also served a BJA data study site. Judge Goss has published and teaches on the subjects of mental health courts and co-occurring disorders, serving on the teaching faculty of the National Judicial College and the National Drug Court Institute. He is a senior advisor to the United States Substance Abuse Mental Health Services Administration's GAINS Center on co-occurring disorders in the criminal justice system. Jennifer holds a Masters Degree in Social Work from the University of Oklahoma. Currently Jennifer is under supervision for clinical licensure. Jennifer's professional experience includes over fifteen years of service in the sexual assault and domestic violence field; she has worked part time as a Batterer Treatment Group Facilitator and has spent time as adjunct faculty at Oklahoma State University, Oklahoma City. Jennifer has been utilized as an expert witness in both domestic violence and sexual assault cases in criminal and military court. She is the recipient of the Gene McBride Community Service Award for her work with sexual assault survivors. Sam Minsky

Sam Minsky, MFT, is a Senior Clinician, Trainer and Supervisor at the "Matrix Institute On Addictions" at the UCLA West Los Angeles office. He has served in various capacities such as Associate Director and Director of the full service outpatient substance abuse clinic. Mr. Minsky has worked in the chemical dependency field since 1988. He is a licensed Marriage and Family Therapist and a specialist in treating the chemically dependent and their families. He has also worked for the Brooklyn New York Criminal Court System as an expert witness in chemical dependency and substance abuse. Mr. Minsky has co-authored a number of articles on research aspects and treatment of the chemically dependent and has been involved in re-writing and updating various components of the Matrix Manuals. He was the lead author on the American Indian and Alaskan Native culturally appropriate patient handouts. The Matrix Model is currently being recommended by the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA), and the Center for Substance Abuse and Treatment (CSAT) as one of a very few useful empirically driven treatment models for substance abusers and the chemically dependant. Mr. Minsky has lectured and given presentations on various aspects of chemical dependency and methods of treatment to numerous universities, hospitals, and therapy centers in the Los Angeles area, nationally, and internationally. Sam has trained clinicians in Thailand, in the Netherlands Antilles Island of Curacao, Capetown, South Africa, Vietnam, United Arab Emirates, numerous Native American Reservations (USA) and First Nation Reserves in Canada. In addition to his Matrix clinical and training duties, Sam has a private practice in West Los Angeles.




Mark Woodward




