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**YOUTH SERVICES FOR OKLAHOMA COUNTY (YSOC)**

- Non-profit 501(c)3 governed by a 20-member Board of Trustees.
- Providing services to at-risk youth and families in Oklahoma County since 1972.
- During the fiscal year ending June 30, 2012, YSOC Programs served 2.771 clients and their family members.

**PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS**

**The Community Intervention Center (CIC)**

- 24-hour holding facility for juveniles arrested by local law enforcement agencies.
- Processed 1,877 youth for 11,400 hours of service in FY 2012.
- Over 98% of the time, law enforcement officers process arrested youth at the CIC and return to the street to protect our community within 15 minutes.

**Family Junction Emergency Youth Shelter**

- Provided 3,179 days of care to 114 displaced and homeless youth in FY 2012.
- Clients' average residency at the shelter is 28 days.
- Many children reside at the Shelter for several months before permanent placement.

**First Time Offender/Skills Education Program**

- Court-ordered consequence program for parents and offending youths, as well as voluntary participants.
- In FY 2012, 262 youth and their parents completed this 4-week program, learning conflict resolution, positive communication, and problem solving skills.

**Outpatient Behavioral Health Services**

**(Youth Counseling Center, Community At-Risk Services {CARS} and Juvenile Re-entry of Oklahoma County {J-ROC} )**

- Internationally CARF accredited youth counseling center provides assessment, crisis intervention, and individual, family and group counseling.
- Over 300 youth received services in FY 2012.
- Community At Risk Services (CARS) provides assessment; crisis intervention; individual, family and group counseling; rehab services; and mentoring to adjudicated youth.
- Juvenile Re-entry of Oklahoma County (J-ROC), piloted with the Oklahoma Office of Juvenile Affairs (OJA) in 2008, was developed to provide re-integration services for Oklahoma County youthful offenders coming out of OJA placement/incarceration. J-ROC services include intensive counseling and independent living skill training. Less than 5% of the program graduates have re-offended.

**Supporting Kids in Independent Living (SKIL)**

- In FY 2012, SKIL served over 170 Oklahoma City high school students who were living on their own due to parental abuse, addiction, incarceration, neglect, or abandonment.
- For the year ending June 30, 2012, 37 SKIL Seniors reached graduation, proceeding to attend college, enter the armed forces, or obtain full-time employment.
